

Orchid Tip of the Month by Scot Mitamura

As we approach what appears to be a very dry summer, we need to be conscious of our watering of our orchids. But how many of us actually know how to water and what is accomplished by a good watering.

First of all, know the water requirements of the different types of orchids you have and how they are potted.

Most of the orchids we grow are of the epiphytic type (growing on another plant), have a thick root surrounded by velamin. These types of roots like to dry slightly between watering. So, you would probably not water them every day, unless they were mounted or in a hanging pot or basket, then you could water them daily. Watering frequency would be determined by the season (day length), heat (light intensity), wind (air movement), type of media, and type of pot. Kind of complicated yeah, so you need to pay attention to the environment and the different orchids in your collection.

Terrestrial orchids have fine hairy roots and require a potting medium that is kept evenly moist, all the time. They will probably need daily watering and a finer type of potting medium. It is a good idea to keep these orchids separate from the epiphytic ones, except the ones that are mounted or hanging.

So now that we have things organized, we must water correctly and with a purpose. I personally prefer to hand water my orchids. I learned that you should "water like a monsoon, then water again, then again". This allows the water to drain through the potting medium flushing out toxic salts that can build up in the media, compared to light frequent watering or through an irrigation system.

I urge everyone to observe an orchid growing in a clear pot being watered, you will be shocked at how unevenly the water percolates through. Even after multiple waterings, there will be dry spots in the media! I water each of my orchids four times from each direction, from each side, on top and underneath the leaves; after all we wash under our arms, right? Other benefits from watering this way are that you strongly discourage insects (scales, mealy bugs, thrips) and spiders (mites) from feeding and nesting in the safe dry haven under the leaves and sheaths. Yes, water is a great pesticide.

In controlling most of your small pests your objective is to disrupt their, feeding and breeding. Water droplets are much larger than them and will surely disrupt them, thus minimizing your need to use harsher chemicals. Other benefits from watering this way are that you will you notice insect and slug/snail problems and be able to treat them before the situation becomes really bad. How many or us realize that one of the worst pests in orchids is weeds.

THE UNIQUE & UNUSUAL

Prior newsletters we showed you an orchid that looked like a Monkey and then a native Hawaiian Orchid that is on the endangered list.

What about Unusual Mounting – this is a miniature orchid mounted on a Pine Cone!! I guess you really can try just about anything!!!

Orchid Tip Continued.....

Well as you water, you will see these weeds, so you can pull them before they seed. How about noticing orchids that have fallen over or have gotten overcrowded or are covering a smaller orchid not giving it enough sunlight and air. What about noticing orchids that need re-potting. I say that hand watering allows you to bond with your collection, keeping you in touch with your orchids.

I have seen it happen so many times where the grower depends of their irrigation system, only to be completely unaware of problems lurking in their collections. I often get asked about Reverse Osmosis systems to improve your water quality. Yes, they are great, but in my opinion not essential to be a good orchid grower in Hawaii. We have great water in Hawaii!

We often confuse hard water stains on the orchid foliage and greenhouses with irrigation systems that are used to chemigate (inject pesticides or fertilizers into the irrigation water), and that are run at a low volume (small orifice/droplet size) and for a short duration. The water droplets atomize and dry on the foliage, leaving the hard water stains. The media never gets properly flushed and salts accumulate in the media to toxic levels where the orchid's roots eventually die.

I look at irrigation systems as a convenience to the grower, but a detriment to the orchids. Of course, if your collection is large, you will at some point need an irrigation system, so if this happens, install that RO System, keep your volume higher and your duration longer, maintain a high Cation Exchange Capacity in your media (normally with peat moss infused with mycorrhiza) allowing you to minimize the need to over fertilize.

Remember fertilizers are soluble salts, this will cause much more salt damage than our water in Hawaii. So, let's get out there and form a relationship with our orchid collection and hand water with a purpose.


NOTE FROM INTERIM EDITOR:
