# Guest Speaker: Sheron Harwood "Growing Orchids in My Backyard"

When her friend Dave Bealer from the Aiea Orchid Society discovered her backyard orchid collection, he encouraged her to join WOS and got Nancy Airhart to invite her to a WOS meeting and the rest is history. 
# **Intergeneric Orchids**

Intergeneric hybrids consist of several different genera that can be crossed together to create new intergeneric orchids. Cochlioda, Miltonia, Odontoglossum, Oncidium and Ada are some of the genera that are commonly used. The result of these hybrids leads to new genera names that can get pretty confusing. Some common intergeneric names are Vuylstekeara (Vuyl.), Colmanara (Colm.), Odontonia and Adaglossum. You will commonly see "mericlones" of intergenerics as they are very easy to clone and produce high quality/high quantity plants.

Some characteristics of Intergeneric orchids are: floriferousness (spray branching, long peduncles, masses of short peduncles); small vs. large flowers; narrow flower parts vs. wide parts; shape of lip, convex, concave vs. flat; crowded vs. spaced flowers and the colors are red, pink, purple vs. yellow (oncidinae).

#### Annual Report/Accomplishment's for 2005-2006 President's Message

Fellow members and guest of the Windward Orchid Society, welcome to our Annual Installation Banquet. I would like to begin by thanking each and every one of you for all your help and support, which you have given the Society and me this past year.
