Problems? We have several highly qualified professionals who have agreed to help you with your particular dilemmas through this column. Write to The Orchid Clinic, P.O. Box 23. Kaneohe, HI 96744.

When you write us, please be as explicit as you can regarding problem, description of the plant, and other pertinent data which may impact on your particular problem. example, how often do you water, fertilize, how much sunlight do you give the plant, etc.

If the condition defies description, bring it to a meeting and have one of our experts look at it. This is probably a better route since, at best, it is difficult to diagnose a problem without visually inspecting the plant.

If you decide to bring your plant in, do come a little early to yourself ample time to resolve your problem before the meeting begins.



Helpful Hints from the Wizard of WOS

In the Land of WOS lives a wise Wizard who roams the country for helpful hints that he can pass you to make orchid culture easier and more efficient. From time to time the "Wiz" will pass on these gems of wisdom to help you grow better orchids with the least possible effort. The Wizard picked up the following from Fern Fernandez which is the best hint we've heard in a long time. it, it works!

HELPFUL HINT: When it's time to repot your cattleya and you find that after you have trimmed off all dead roots, there are no roots left with which to anchor your plant firmly into the pot, what can you do? Have no fear, the Wizard is here! This is what you do. Bend one end of a wire into a triangle. Bend the whole triangle portion perpen-



Here's another great hint from Fern: Put your back cutting in an empty pot and leave it in the same general area as the rest of your plants until it generates a new shoot. This will ensure that the back cutting will get the same care as the rest of your plants everytime you spray, and you will soon have another healthy plant to repot and add to your collection.
