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Orchid Tip of the Month

Winter is here, so cut back on your watering. Try to allow your orchids to dry before watering again. Maintain good air circulation (this will dry the orchids faster) and watch for fungal infections. If found, remove diseased tissue immediately and treat with a fungicide. Phalaenopsis should be spiking and beginning to flower. Hono Honos should be dropping their foliage in preparation for their spring flowering.

Early History of Orchids

In Europe an interest in orchids can be traced back to Greek and Roman times. At that time, people knew only of the terrestrial orchids, which were vastly different from the tropical epiphytes. Like many ancient civilizations, the Greeks drew on the resources of the natural world, and the tubers and roots of most European terrestrial orchids were valued for various medicinal purposes. They studied the curious orchid flowers and believed that the different shapes revealed the beneficial effects of the plant. For example, *the man orchid* (*Aceras anthropophorum*) was thought to be an aphrodisiac because the shape of the lip resembled the figure of a man.

The word orchid is, in fact, derived from the Greek "orchis" meaning testes, which refers to the tubers found in pairs in some species.

By the late 18th century, the British Empire had spread across the globe. Merchant ships returned from the New World laden with previously unknown species of plants and animals. At the same time, the forerunner of the modern greenhouse was being developed to accommodate the newly arrived tropical plants, and especially orchids. These greenhouses were huge steel and glass structures with a system of heating by cast-iron piping and large, solid-fuel boilers. With steel in plentiful supply from the foundries, the construction of greenhouses developed into an industry supplying botanical gardens and large private country estates. Orchids became a status symbol for the rich and famous, and a lively trade ensued to satisfy this need.

Nurserymen and private collectors sponsored their own expeditions to send hunters to new regions in search of previously unknown orchids to add to their collections. There were many tales of daring exploits, hardship, disease and sometimes death in the world's remote tropical rainforests but this did nothing to lessen the growing desire for orchids.
